## INTERNATIONAL BOARD FOR CERTIFICATION OF GROUP PSYCHOTHERAPISTS PRESENTS 2019 HAROLD S. BERNARD GROUP PSYCHOTHERAPY TRAINING AWARD TO JUDITH COCHÉ, PHD, ABPP, CGP, LFAGPA

**NEW YORK, February 20, 2019** – The International Board for Certification of Group Psychotherapists will be presenting the 2019 Harold S. Bernard Group Psychotherapy Training Award to Judith Coché, PhD, ABPP, CGP, LFAGPA. The presentation will take place during AGPA Connect 2019 in Los Angeles at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel on Thursday, February 28 during the Membership Community Meeting.

This award was established in 2001 and is given annually to an individual or organization whose work in group training and/or education contributes to excellence in the practice of group psychotherapy. It was renamed through a legacy gift provided to the Group Foundation for Advancing Mental Health by Dr. Bernard for the purpose of endowing the award. Throughout his lifetime, training in group psychotherapy was near and dear to Dr. Bernard's heart. His legacy bequest and this award insure that individuals and programs meeting a high standard of training quality be identified and honored for their contributions to the field in developing the next generation of clinicians who use group psychotherapy to help people.

Dr. Judith Coché is being recognized with this award due to her significant contributions to the training and supervision of group psychotherapists throughout her career (often on a pro bono basis). At the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine residency training program she has embedded standards of excellence in group in over 150 of tomorrow's leaders in psychiatry. Dr. Coché convinced the Department of Psychiatry to require that each faculty member teaching group therapy attain the CGP credential. By creating and expanding the group psychotherapy program (Power of Groups) for Psychiatric Residents at Penn and through programs offered nationally and internationally via AGPA and the International Association for Group Psychotherapy and Group Processes (IAGP), Dr. Coché has consistently provided opportunities for psychiatrists, psychologists and other professional providers to become well educated and certified in the practice of group psychotherapy.

She has been dedicated to the supervision of graduate students in group psychotherapy and developed a two-year pro bono mentoring program in which a student co-leads a therapy group with her and receives supervision. Dr. Coché has instilled her commitment and knowledge about group therapy in her trainees who have developed group psychotherapy training programs in many cities and countries. She has developed a model of group therapy for couples which has been the focus of numerous widely distributed books and training DVDs. She is a prolific writer with three books, and over forty journal articles and invited chapters. She has long championed certification as a necessary statement of ethical and professional expertise in group therapy

"Dr. Coché is a respected and generous teacher whose dedication to supporting and growing the field of group psychotherapy personifies this award," said Tony L.
