NEW YORK, February 20, 2025— The American Group Psychotherapy Association (AGPA) announced that Ronnie Levine, PhD, ABPP, CGP, AGPA-DF, and D. Thomas Stone Jr., PhD, CGP, AGPA-DF, will be awarded Distinguished Fellowship in the Association at its upcoming AGPA Connect 2025 in San Francisco, March 3 – March 8 at the Hyatt Regency San Francisco. The award presentation will take place during the Tri-Organizational Awards Ceremony on Wednesday, March 5, 2025, 6:00 PM. Distinguished Fellowship is the highest honor bestowed by the Association, recognizing outstanding leadership and contributions to the field of group psychotherapy.

Dr. Levine is being recognized for her outstanding contributions to group psychotherapy, her commitment to advancing the field, and her exemplary professionalism, compassion, and humor in group settings. A highly respected educator, she has taught for over 30 years at the Center for the Advancement of Group Studies and served on the faculty of the Eastern Group Psychotherapy Society and New York University School of Medicine. As a dedicated member of AGPA, Dr. Levine has contributed significantly through her work with Affiliate Societies and her role on the editorial board of the *International Journal of Group Psychotherapy*. Known for amplifying diverse voices and her exceptional communication style, her AGPA institutes remain among the most sought-after.

Dr. Stone is being recognized for his more than 30 years of dedicated leadership and service to AGPA and the broader field of group psychotherapy. His contributions include significant work with disadvantaged populations, immigrant and refugee groups, and his commitment to antiracism. In addition, he has conducted a wide array of group training and educational programs in diverse settings. During challenging times, Dr. Stone's composed, firm, and compassionate presence has been invaluable. Colleagues praise his energy, intelligence, humility, and friendly demeanor, as well as his enduring dedication to group psychotherapy.

"Distinguished Fellowship recognizes those who are seminal leaders, teachers, clinicians, researchers and authors in the global community of group psychotherapy," said President Lorraine Wodiska, PhD, ABPP, CGP, AGPA-F. "Drs. Levine and Stone, with their local, national and internationally renowned leadership in AGPA and the group psychotherapy field, epitomize this recognition."
